WSTLC is a middle level program designed for students with emotional and behavioral disabilities. Small classroom sizes and a team-based approach enables us to provide individualized programming for each student.

- Classrooms implement the Boys Town Specialized Classroom Management model to teach and develop social skills
- Strong focus on individual student needs and goals
- Students receive individual and group counseling to address social-emotional needs and targeted social skills
- Curriculum includes implementation of grade level curriculum focusing on the Common Core Learning Standards
- Instructional strategies designed to meet the needs of students with various abilities
- Programming offered during the regular school year, and extended school year
- Structured academic curriculum and comprehensive academic support and intervention
